THE LAST POST



McKEAGUE – Mabel "Jackie" (nee Jackson)



October 26, 1923 - July 24, 2011

Jackie McKeague died suddenly at Emma Lake, SK on Sunday, July 24, 2011, surrounded by family.

Mabel Arlene Jackson was born October 26, 1923 in Kirkland, New Brunswick. She was the third of four daughters born to Clarence and Georgia (Winchester) Jackson, and was brought up on their

New Brunswick farm. Mabel enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force Women's Division on May 20, 1943. In the air force Mabel became known as Jackie. While posted in Newfoundland during WWII she met Vernon (Vern) McKeague, an air force navigator from Sibbald, Alberta. Vern and Jackie were married September 4, 1946 shortly after Jackie's discharge from the air force. After the war Vern transferred to the regular air force. They lived in Prince Edward Island, Alberta, Ontario (Toronto, Ottawa), England, New York and Saskatchewan for varying lengths of time, and had three children over these years. While they were in Ottawa in 1970 Jackie began working at Sears where she remained until retirement. In 1974 Vern and Jackie moved to Calgary where they have lived ever since.

Jackie was an excellent cook, a wonderful knitter and a whiz at crossword puzzles. Jackie enjoyed observing nature, particularly on trips to their condo at Fairmont and her son's cabin at Emma Lake.

Jackie was a member of the Air Force Association of Canada, the Ex-Service Women's Club and St. David's United Church. Jackie was also a member of the Aero Space Museum of Calgary and of the Western Canada Aviation Museum in Winnipeg

Jackie was predeceased by her three sisters, Annice (Harold) Dickinson; Agnes (Hank) Dickinson; and Hazel (Jack) Marshall. Jackie is survived by her loving husband, Vern; her children, David (Neva) McKeague, Dale (Lorraine Hope) McKeague and Heather McKeague; her grandchildren, Reche (Trevor Newell), Caileen (Ryan Schmidt), Sean, Maureen and Reed McKeague; her great grandchildren, Aidan, Milo, Katie and Libby; and by various nieces and nephews.

Jackie will be sorely missed.


The Cafe was host to a fabulous mid-day meal of Buffalo (or was it Bison?). Lunch featured various Sandwiches and

Sift together dry ingredients and add to the first mixture.

Fold in the fruit and pecans. (pre-roasted pecans give good flavour).

Sprinkle toppings on muffins before baking.

Bake for 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 12 medium muffins.

RAF Permanent Air Movement Detachment (PAMD) Canada stand proud at Canadian Battle of Britain Parade



On 18 Sep 11, RAF Permanent Air Movements Detachment (PAMD) Canada stood proudly alongside Canadian colleagues at the Battle of Britain parades in Calgary, Alberta and St Johns, Newfoundland. Invited to attend by the local Air Force Associations and continuing the long standing tradition of RAF attendance, the parade marks the hard won victory of the RAF over the Luftwaffe in 1940.

The St Johns parade and ceremony was held at the Newfoundland National War Memorial where FS Ian Harvey and Sgt Eddie Knight met Canadian Air Force (CAF) members including the St Johns (Pleasantville) and Gander Base Commanders. Tributes to commemorate comrades lost in the battle were read by CAF veterans before wreaths were laid by local dignitaries, CAF representatives and the RAF.

The Battle of Britain took place from 10 Jul to 31 Oct, 1940. Eighty Canadian fighter pilots fought in the Battle of Britain out of approximately 500 non-British aircrew. They mainly served in No. 1 (later 401) Squadron RCAF and No. 242 Squadron RAF (Canadians serving with the 242 Sqn were commanded by Douglas Bader, the famous "Legless Ace").

The remainder of the Canadians were scattered through another dozen RAF Squadrons. The 42 Canadians who served with No.1 and 242 Squadrons were credited with 60 German aircraft being destroyed and another 50 probable or damaged. Twenty Canadians were killed in action; three of those while serving with No.1 RCAF Squadron.



RCAF pilots scramble for their Hurricane aircraft in early 1941. The RCAF received its first Hurricanes in February 1939 and the first RCAF squadron to take the aircraft into combat was No. 1 (Canadian) – later 401 – Squadron, which flew the Hurricane during the Battle of Britain.

The Luftwaffe started out with 3000 aircraft including 1100 fighters. The RAF started with 700 fighters. At the end of the battle, RAF Fighter Command was estimated to have lost 800 aircraft with 400 pilots killed. The Luftwaffe losses were about 1300 aircraft lost. Reported aircraft loss estimates vary. During the official four months of the Battle of Britain, 3080 pilots served with RAF Fighter Command.

Marking the occasion for the RAF in Calgary was Flt Lt Matt Sharrock and Sgt Si Hammond. Flt Lt Sharrock who took up post as OC PAMD Canada in Jul 11 was delighted to share the occasion with Mr Kenn Nixon of the Air Force Association of Canada. The RAF has had an enduring presence in Canada from the mid 1930s with the Calgary detachment having been established for over 3 decades. The parade was also attended by members of the governing political parties and local cadet forces.

It is because of the efforts of those allied pilots and ground crew involved in the Battle of Britain that Winston Churchill made his famous statement: "The gratitude of every home in our island, in our Empire and indeed, throughout the world, except in the abodes of the guilty, goes out to the British airmen who, undaunted by the odds, unwearied in their constant challenge and mortal danger, turned the tide of the world war by their prowess and their devotion. Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

Monopoly - WWII

This is a neat piece of trivia.



(You'll never look at the game the same way again!)

Starting in 1941, an increasing number of British Airmen found themselves as the involuntary guests of the Third Reich, and the Crown was casting about for ways and means to facilitate their escape...

Now obviously, one of the most helpful aids to that end is a useful and accurate map, one showing not only where stuff was, but also showing the locations of 'safe houses' where a POW on-the-lam could go for food and shelter.

Paper maps had some real drawbacks -- they make a lot of noise when you open and fold them, they wear out rapidly, and if they get wet, they turn into mush. Someone in MI-5 (similar to America 's OSS) got the idea of printing escape maps on silk It's durable, can be scrunched-up into tiny wads, and unfolded as many times as needed, and makes no noise whatsoever.

At that time, there was only one manufacturer in Great Britain that had perfected the technology of printing on silk, and that was John Waddington, Ltd. When approached by the government, the firm was only too happy to do its bit for the war effort.

By pure coincidence, Waddington was also the U.K. Licensee for the popular American board game, Monopoly. As it happened, 'games and pastimes' was a category of item qualified for insertion into 'CARE packages', dispatched by the International Red Cross to prisoners of war.

Under the strictest of secrecy, in a securely guarded and inaccessible old workshop on the grounds of Waddington's, a group of sworn-to-secrecy employees began mass-producing escape maps, keyed to each region of Germany or Italy where Allied POW camps were located). When processed, these maps could be folded into such tiny dots that they would actually fit inside a Monopoly playing piece.

As long as they were at it, the clever workmen at Waddington's also managed to add:

- 1. A playing token, containing a small magnetic compass
- 2. A two-part metal file that could easily be screwed together
- 3. Useful amounts of genuine high-denomination German, Italian, and French currency, hidden within the piles of Monopoly money!

British and American air crews were advised, before taking off on their first mission, how to identify a 'rigged' Monopoly set -- by means of a tiny red dot, one cleverly rigged to look like an ordinary printing glitch, located in the corner of the Free Parking square.

Of the estimated 35,000 Allied POWS who successfully escaped, an estimated one-third were aided in their flight by the rigged Monopoly sets.. Everyone who did so was sworn to secrecy indefinitely, since the British Government might want to use this highly successful ruse in still another, future war.

The story wasn't declassified until 2007, when the surviving craftsmen from Waddington's, as well as the firm itself, were finally honored in a public ceremony.

It's always nice when you can play that 'Get Out of Jail' Free' card!

I realize some of you are (probably) too young to have any personal connection to WWII (Dec. '41 to Aug. '45), but this is still interesting.
