

Any other duties as requested by the family.



Continued from Jan/Feb Newsletter Part 2 Memories of World War II....

One of the most devastating raids on London was when hundreds of bombs pounded the whole area causing the highest casualties. Among the majestic buildings that were hit was the House of Commons, the Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, Buckingham Palace, St. Paul's Cathedral and the Royal Mint. It is hard to believe that London and the surrounding areas survived that time, also a miracle how one house could remain standing when all around were demolished.

Nightly, and for many weeks, air raids continued but somehow our daily domestic lives went on, including grocery shopping with our ration coupons, however no sweets, no chocolate, no toys, no comics, no bananas or oranges were available. Any time we were away from the safety of our home we were always conscious of the nearest air raid shelter. Sometimes it would be an underground rail station where hundreds of people slept every night too frightened to remain in their own homes. The sounds of war continued sporadically, the dreaded sirens and the frantic rush to the air raid shelters got to be almost a way of life, and being so young I just shrugged it off because everyone else seemed that it was the normal way of life. Our crackly radio still belting out the songs of the day:

There'll be bluebirds over
The white cliffs of Dover
Tomorrow just you wait and see
There'll be love and laughter
And peace ever after
Tomorrow when the world is free

The war ended in 1945. Great Britain lost more than 300,000 fighting men and women, 60,000 civilians and there were just too many injuries to count.

The effects of World War II war were still being felt, just a few years ago when a rusty 2,000 pound unexploded German bomb was uncovered in East London during the excavation for a 2012 Olympic venue; this bomb could have caused catastrophic damage, a huge crater and sent fragments flying more than half a mile away, it was destroyed by a controlled explosion.

The lucky survivors of the war had gone through hell; literally, and we still remember, to this day, the scariest sound of all: DEAD SILENCE.

I've really enjoyed telling you my story, many of you have had firsthand experience of the hardships of war, and I'm sure you are all aware of the importance of recording the memorable events in your life to preserve them for your children in the future. Although I am now an American citizen a little part of my heart still belongs to London. But today I do feel that during the war years the British people were at their best as never before or since. It was indeed their finest hour, for the first two years they stood alone in Europe, then they were on the rack for almost six years, most people neither sought nor glorified the war, and they gained nothing from it. There were many other factors of the war that I had no direct knowledge of including the Evacuation when 3,500,000 people (mostly children) were sent out of the cities (some even to the US and Canada) for their safety. I was just lucky like many to have survived and witnessed just a little of it.

NEWSFLASH

Last Month a Bomb was found in the Silt on The River Thames in London. The bomb was manually floated down the river to safe place and disposed of.

According to historians between September 1940 and may 1941, German planes dropped about 24,000 tons of explosive bombs on London and 10% of all the bombs that dropped did not detonate. And so it continues....

I have enjoyed sharing this story with you, it has helped me understand what happened during World War 11 when my sister was a child. I was born after the war and luckily I have not experienced anything like this. Sue

Mural of Honour



The Mural project was launched in November 2005 as a fundraising project for the new Founders' Gallery at the Military Museums. The process of installing the Mural panels began in November 2006, and the completed mural was unveiled in the atrium of The Military Museums on 9 November 2007.

The 240 tiles that represent Canada's military history from the War of 1812 to present day operations are highlighted by an interactive display in the Museum's atrium. The collective stories reveal the different theatres of war Canadians have been involved in for nearly 200 years, including both overseas and domestic operations.

INGREDIENTS

- 1-1/4 pounds ground pork
- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 1/4 pound ground veal
- 1 cup grated peeled potatoes
- 1/2 cup grated onion
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon dried savory
- 1/4 teaspoon rubbed sage
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons water,

FAVORITE FRENCH CANADIAN MEAT PIE

DIRECTIONS

In a large skillet over medium heat, cook the pork, beef, veal, potatoes and onion until meat is no longer pink; drain. Stir in the garlic, seasonings and 1/4 cup water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring frequently.

Remove from the heat; cool to room temperature. Stir in bread crumbs. Combine egg and remaining water; stir into meat mixture.

Line a 9-in. pie plate with bottom pastry; trim even with edge. Fill with meat mixture. Roll out remaining pastry to fit top of pie; place over filling. Trim, seal and flute edges. Cut slits in pastry. Cover edges loosely with foil.

Bake at 400° for 15 minutes. Remove foil. Reduce heat to 375°; bake 30-35 minutes longer or until crust is golden brown and filling is heated

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup raspberry jam
- 1 1/4 cups heavy cream
- 1 tablespoon granulated sugar
- 1 cup fresh raspberries
4 cookies

How to Make It

Step 1

In a large bowl, beat the heavy cream with the sugar until stiff peaks form.

Step 2

In a small bowl, whisk the jam until smooth; fold into the whipped cream. Spoon into serving bowls and garnish with the raspberries and cookies.
