Member Profile - Lorne Fleming

Lorne, born 1934, is a proud native Calgarian, who attended both Balmoral and Crescent Heights Schools. His brother Earle was a member of the 1940s original 52 Squadron and Lorne's hopes were to follow his lead. In 1950, the 403 (FB) Reserve RCAF Squadron offered a summer program with training taking place in Abbotsford BC. *Recruit* Fleming, while there, had particularly liked "Drill" which helped him advance, as on the second night of recruitment, the brand new 538 Cadet Squadron had arrived there as well. Due to their increased training needs, *Cadet* Fleming became Sergeant Fleming to help train the new cadets. The original home of 538 squadron was located at 1206- 1 St. SE for many years. They then joined together with 52 and 604 and jointly moved to the H-Huts at Mewata Armories. During 538's early years, their civilian committee, chaired by Mr. Jim Askew, convinced League HQ to implement a flying scholarship for first year cadets as a recruitment incentive under the leadership of Training Officer F/L Stan Dundas and civilian Instructor Frank Foster, Lorne and fellow cadet Denny May (son of the WW1 flying hero "Wap" May). The instructor coached these two to qualify for the 1951 scholarships.

Summer camp took place at Abbotsford AF Base and while there, F/S Fleming was able to participate in a fly past involving most of the 1951 Western Canadian flying scholarship cadets. After that camp Lorne divided his time between 403 and 538 until **1956 -1959** when he joined the RCAF. After training at St. Jean, Que. he was told with his past service that he qualified for a posting wherever *he* wished to serve. In typical military style, he was sent to Penhold (80 miles from home). One very good thing to come out of this posting was meeting the sister (Ethel) of one of his fellow airmen, Ed Smith. She became Lorne's life companion of over 60 years!

After leaving the forces, he became involved in Cadets again on the civilian side. He acted as secretary to the sponsoring group which included 52, 538 and 604. In 1968, Lorne received his commission and served as 538's Admin Officer and then Training Officer. This was during the Paul Hellier, green uniform era, and so he never got to wear the Air Force blues. It was also at this time when the ACLO's separated the three squadrons and dismantled #15 Wing. Lorne took over the Commanding Officer's position of 52 Squadron from 1973 to 1976. It was during that period that Lorne worked closely with 783's Charley Witcher in the reorganizing that was desperately required to resolve many operational difficulties. This feat took most of his service time as CO but finally brought 52 back to a functional level.

During the era of the Calgary Cadet Military Tattoo's, Lorne was the Air element's coordinator for the last year that the tri-service event was held. Sadly, due to Tatroo rehearsal times conflicting with Cadet mandatory training these constraints caused the Tatroo to close.

One of Lorne's favorite projects was working with Bev Spielman in arranging a citizenship tour of Maelstrom AF Base in Great Falls, Montana. This was the first ever co-ed trip which saw 65 male cadets and 35 female cadets partaking in the tour. Because of the success of this trip, a tour to Whitehorse when Queen Elizabeth visited there in 1974 became the beginning of females joining their male counterparts. This helped to lead the integration of females into the Air Cadet squadrons of today.

After cadets, his afterlife, he joined Calgary Transit in 1960, first as a transit bus driver, then in 1979 as a Training Officer and in 1980 he became instrumental in developing the startup LRT training program. He completed his long Transit career in 1990; BUT once again got the *Air Blues* and joined 783 Wing.

He and Ethel are active member of their church. From July 2011 until December 12th, 2012, the Flemings served a mission in the Philippines caring for medical needs of ailing missionaries.

They have been blessed with four children (two boys, two girls) ten grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Beverly Ethel Melbourne
July 5, 1938 - April 9, 2022

Beverly Melbourne passed away April 9, 2022. Born in Verdun, Quebec on July 5, 1938, to William Stanley and Mary Couch. She is survived by her husband of fifty-seven years John Melbourne.

Beverly joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1958 and was stationed in St Hubert, Quebec, with 401 Squadron as an Accountant. She left the RCAF in 1964 and worked as an Executive Assistant for several Petro Chemical Companies. In 1986 she joined the Royal Canadian Air Force Association and held executive positions at wing, and group levels and was the Alberta Group Secretary from 1990 to 1998. Beverly was awarded the National Member of the year in 2000 and the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002.

In 1995 Beverly became involved with The RCAF Benevolent Fund supporting Air Force veterans and veterans' widows. From 2002 on she served as the National Chairperson of the Fund until its disbandment in 2007.

In 2000 She participated in the formation of the Air Force Museum Society of Alberta which became part of The Military Museums. She was a Founding Member and was made a Life Member of the Museum.
