





Member Profile

Robert (Bob) Lilja (Cpl Ret)

Bob was born in Provost in 1927 and grew up on the family farm at Hayter. He joined the Provost Air Cadet Squadron in 1943 at the age of 16.

Once he saw the poster for the RCAF which stated "Join the RCAF and see the world", Bob did just that and joined the RCAF on April 1, 1946. After signing up, he was sent to Manning Depot in Portage LaPrairie and then to Aylmer, Ontario for his Aero Engineer tech training.

Bob went on to postings at #10 Repair Depot Calgary (1947) where he worked on all types of aircraft from regular maintenance to recovery tasks. He then moved onto Flying Schools at Claresholm (1951) and Penhold (1953) and then finally to 425 Fighter Squadron at St. Hubert (1954). During his career, he obtained the nickname of "Swede". It seems the paymaster could not wrap his tongue around the difference of "J" and "Y" in the Swedish vernacular for his last name Lilja, so instead just called him Swede. That name stuck

with him throughout his service time. Bob was discharged in September 1957 with the rank of Corporal.

Following his military service Bob was employed by Canadian Pacific Airline Repair (CPAR) which operated the #10 Repair Depot for RCAF. During his time with the CPAR he worked out of Cold Lake, Alberta and Churchill, Manitoba on Lancaster and Mitchell aircraft which were involved with the Nike Missile project. In 1963 CPAR had a reduction in staff so he went to work for a track vehicle company, Nodwell, in the service department. Most of his time was spent in the high artic working on projects for oil companies. In 1974 Bob wanted to ease up on the strenuous work in the artic so he changed to working on farm equipment as a service technician for White Farm Equipment. In 1977 he became Service Manager for Western Canada. Bob finally retired in 1992 to spend more time with his family.

During his service time with the RCAF it wasn't all work. Bob and his mates enjoyed activities like bowling at Gibson's Bowling Alley and especially the weekly dances at a club downtown. In 1949 he and his friend wanted to attend a dance, but said friend had a mishap leaving the barracks, broke his ankle and so Bob was left to go on his own. As Bob entered the dance they were setting up for a square dance and were short a spot. One of his buddies noticed him and called out "Hey Swede" come and join us. This encounter introduced Bob to Elsie. A few more dance nights and he decided that she was going to be his dance partner for the rest of

his life, a dance that lasted over 70 years. Their family included two daughters, two sons and six grandchildren.



During his time with White Farm Equipment, he attended a trade show in Scottsdale, Arizona, highlighting farm machinery. The guest speaker was Neil Armstrong. As Bob was an early riser, he decided to go into the cafe for breakfast and found he and Armstrong were the only two in there. They had breakfast together and had a wonderful visit. How many members can say they ate with the "man on the moon"? According to Bob, Armstrong was "very down to earth". (Sorry for that one folks).




In his leisure time after retirement he drove fishing groups to their favourite locales,





Bob was instrumental in spearheading the groundwork for the memorial commemorating the location of 10RD at what is now ATCO, on the site of the original depot. He continues to participate in Wing activities and meetings. An affable gentleman with a sly sense of humour and a

great source of Air Force history, he is a very valuable member of the Wing.



National Awards

The National Honours and Awards Committee will be comprised of a Chair (Honourary National President), members, National Chairperson, National Vice-Chairperson and an honest broker appointed by the National Board. Individuals are not permitted to site on the committee during a year in which he or she is nominated. Nominations may be made by individuals, Wings, or groups. Submissions will be held in confidence until the selection process has been completed.

Order of Excellence: this is the highest award presented to members held in the highest esteem by their fellow members in recognition of their continuing outstanding service to the Association, their community and their country. Member will have normally received Meritorious or Distinguished Service awards to be considered for this award.

Long Service Award: this is awarded to deserving members in recognition and appreciation of outstanding, long (more than 20 continuous years) and faithful service to the Association. This is the second most prestigious award.

Distinguished Service Award: this is the third highest award of the Association and is awarded to individual in recognition and appreciation for distinguished service. Members would normally have received the Meritorious Service Award.

Meritorious Service Award: this is the fourth highest award and is presented in recognition and appreciation of outstanding service.

Wing of the Year: is present to the Wing whose efforts have most enhanced the aims of the Association.

Member of the Year: honours the performance of an individual whose skill, enthusiasm, inspiration, direction or leadership has been well above ordinary has positively influenced the national body of the Association.

Christina Handler Memorial Award: is awarded to a member in a non-elected position who has worked tirelessly and unselfishly for the Association.
